As a young man, Elgin enjoyed playing basketball during his high school years. He later attended college for a time, where he especially enjoyed studying music.

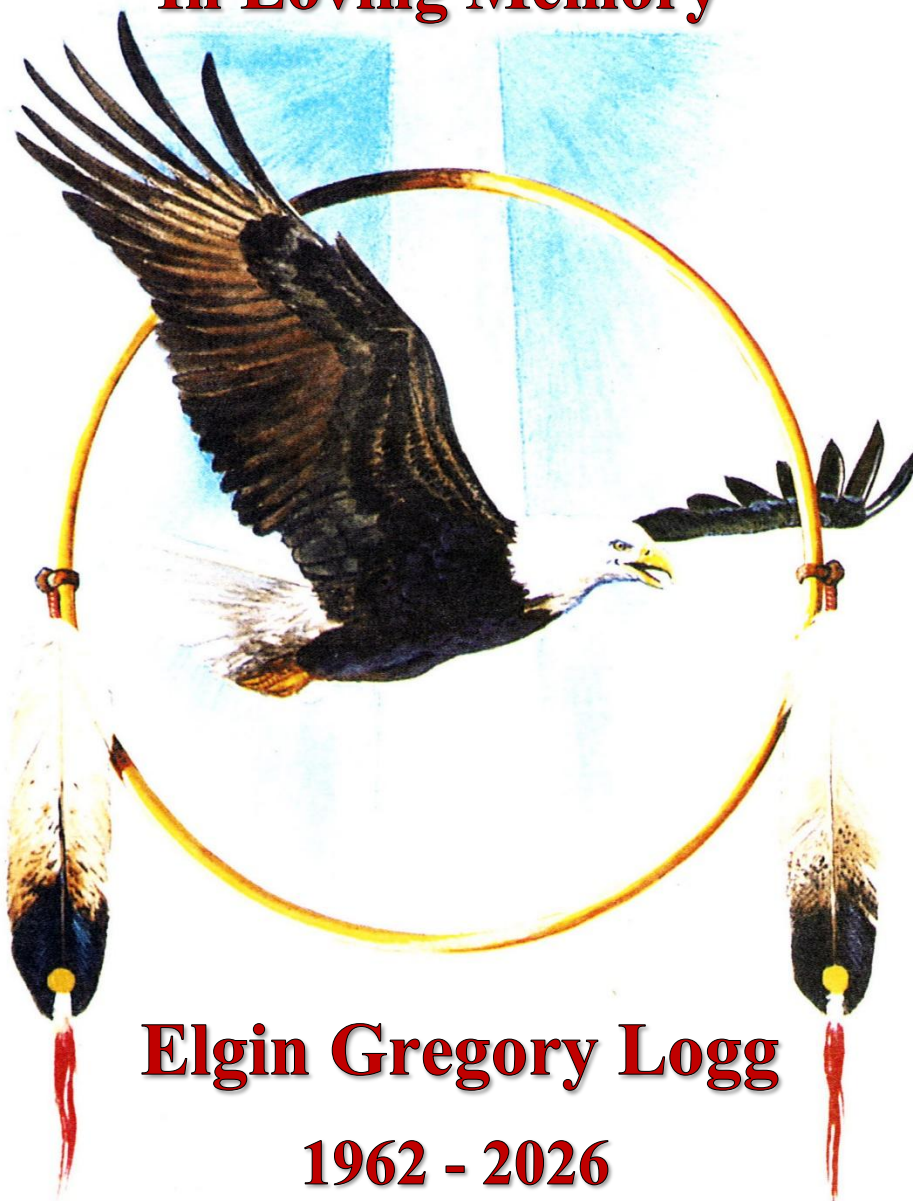
