

Eldon Bouren, 71, of Ree Heights, passed away Wednesday, November 3, 2010 at the Avera McKennan Hospital in Sioux Falls.

Eldon Alfred Bouren was born November 7, 1938 in Miller, South Dakota to Alfred and Hazel (Pedersen) Bouren. He lived on a farm until moving to Ree Heights, SD in 1950. Eldon was preceded in death by his father; Alfred, and a nephew; Shannon Scott.


